Interim Treasurer Just the Facts, Ma'am

These days the news is full of accusations, speculations, and downright cynicism regarding where and how our tax dollars that we, you and I, pay are being used or not used. For every "straight" answer you hear, you find rebuttals saying that is not how they are being used, or if so, that is not the way they should be used. It is enough to force you to turn away, shaking your head; if only there were some set of data that had it all spelled out in a clear format that you know you can trust. If only there were transparency.

The good news is, for us, United Women in Faith, there is one place we can go and see where each dollar comes from and where it goes. I confess, I am a numbers nerd (perhaps a handy attribute for a treasurer??), so I went looking for and found it in the Financials Section of the United Women in Faith website https://uwfaith.org/who-we-are/financials/. This puts you in the Financial Section addressing Financial Stewardship. The words that introduce that section are key:

United Women in Faith is trusted with contributions from members, mission partners, and donors who have a heart for the work we do with women, children, and youth. We are committed to good stewardship of this generous support. We post our annual reports and disclosures for our members and supporters to see our impact. If you have questions, please email missiongiving@uwfaith.org

Listed on that page are the reports available for anyone to read and study, including reports of financial activities from 2023 to 2019. (These will be updated to 2024 as soon as that year's reports are fully finalized and audited.) For now, I will share information from the 2023 Treasurers Report and the 2023 Grants DISCLOSURE document. What did I learn in my study of these?

First, the Grants DISCLOSURE is a fascinating 26-page document (remember I am a numbers nerd) that reveals not only how the money was used but also the sources of that money, Mission Giving, Designated Giving (e.g. Call to Prayer and Self Denial, a combination of Mission Giving and Brighter Future for Children and Youth etc..) or other sources such as specific designated gifts, e.g. Red Bird Mission, Brooks-Howell Home.

This allows us to see that the money we said we would spend on a program is indeed what we said we would. For instance, we were told our "Gifts to A Call to Prayer and Self-Denial 2023 will directly support United Women in Faith's racial justice work, which is helping to create a more equitable society. Your gift supports both our campaign to interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline and our long-standing work building members' capacity to implement the Charter for Racial Justice at all levels of the organization." When I looked at the Grant DISCLOSURE document, I found three programs funded directly from 2023 Prayer and Self-Denial offerings:

- Children's Defense Fund \$5,000.00 think School-to-prison pipeline
- National Council of Formerly Incarcerated Women \$5,000.00 School-to-Prison pipeline and Racial Justice
- Partners for Dignity & Rights \$5,000.00 Racial Justice

There you have it, clear, straightforward. And this is just one example. Look around and you will find it is all there. In these crazy times, at least you know you can get straight answers...from whom?? From United Women in Faith. Just the facts, Ma'am.

This position does not involve dealing with a lot of cash (mostly checks). The cash that is collected at our 4 events is about the only cash that must be counted and a count assistant is required for that. The treasurer needs to have computer skills and the ability to insert numbers into a spreadsheet and most importantly will need to be in communication with local unit treasurers by sending them quarterly letters and answering their questions when they call.

Jan Taylor, our vice-president, has been wearing two hats, her own position and that of secretary. If you know of someone who would be interested or willing to accept this position, please contact either me or Donna Parks Hill.

Now for the stormy weather. We should ideally already have our proposed slate of officers for 2026. That has not happened yet. There is lots of work to be done and very little time to do it as the slate of 2026 proposed officers must be published in the next newsletter; District members are required to be notified no less than 30 days before the election at Annual Celebration which is August 23.

Positions that will need to be filled:

President - This is Linda's 4th year **Vice President -** This is Jan's 4th year

Treasurer – By Year-end, Nancy will have served as interim treasurer for 2.5 years.

Secretary – Jan has been serving as acting secretary for almost 4 years.

Spiritual Growth Coordinator - This year is Sherry's 2nd year, and she has served 4 years. She also served a 2 year term as president.

Mission, Education, & Interpretation - This is Terri's 2nd year. She may serve an additional 2-year term.

Membership, Nurture, & Outreach Coordinator - This is Jane's 2nd year. She may serve an additional 2-year term.

Secretary of Program Resources - This is Brenda's 4th year.

According to our Standing Rules, "No elected leader shall hold the same office for more than four (4) years, except the treasurer, who can hold the same office for six years. Tenure on the Executive Committee for the elected leadership of the District shall be a total of eight (8) years."



Spiritual Growth



Legacy Energizer
A Legacy one Mug at a time.

The Legacy Endowment Fund of United Women in Faith is a permanently invested endowment that supports the work of improving the lives of women, children, and youth at home and abroad. Gifts to the Legacy Endowment Fund build financial resources that ensure United Women in Faith can carry out our vital programs and activities for many years to come.

What follows is the inspiring story of one member's decision to find a way to support the Legacy Fund. It began with a Mug adapted from an article by Cecilia Malm in the November/December 2023 issue of response. Claudia Davis had recently moved to Billings, Montana, with her husband and children and was looking to connect with people in her new community. "I got a phone call inviting me to attend a Christmas party," she recalls. "It was a mug exchange. And, it turns out, also a meeting of the local United Methodist Women unit." As the unit leaders gave a report on the national and international impact of the organization and described missional work all over the globe, Davis says, "I thought to myself, I want to belong to an organization like this that is making a real difference." When she heard about the launch of The Legacy Endowment Fund, she was supportive from the start. "I had worked with nonprofits, and I knew from those experiences how important having an endowment is to an organization," she says. "I understood right away how the interest generated by The Legacy Endowment Fund could help underwrite administrative costs so that more money could go directly into mission." As Davis and her husband sat down to create their wills, "we decided that a percentage of what remained of our estates would go to The Legacy Endowment Fund of United Women in Faith. It was an easy decision since the organization has been such a big part of my life and I want it to continue to have an impact for many years to come."

By making a planned gift, Davis automatically became a member of United Women in Faith's 1869 Society. Members of the 1869 Society receive special recognition from the organization, invitations to events, and a monthly newsletter with additional financial planning information. These days, Davis can reflect over a mug of coffee or tea on her decision to include United Women in Faith in her estate plans and say, "It makes me incredibly happy to be a part of something that I know can do so much for the world." HISTORIAN



As I have been reading through the book "United Women for Change: 150 years in Mission", this greatly piqued my attention. My first thought was, "Oh how we need this today," especially in our own beloved country. It also was another "Wow" moment for UMW women (I have many) and today's UWFaith women who serve bravely and boldly.

After World War II it was all too clear to the nation's churches that the world needed a viable institution to help avoid the horror of war. United Methodist Women predecessors sent cards to the U.S. State Department urging the United States to join a world peace organization founded in 1945 — the United Nations. United Methodist Women predecessors joined the wider church and the ecumenical community in supporting the work of the United Nations and brought groups from around the country to New York City for seminars on its work.


This effort grew and church leaders began looking for more adequate accommodations for these seminars. They identified a property near 44th Street and First Avenue, directly across from the United Nations. Although it was an ecumenical effort, The Methodist Church took the lead but turned to the women for financing. Convinced of the importance of this work for peace, the Woman's Society of Christian Service provided a total of \$800,000 to secure the property and facilitate a mortgage from New York Life Insurance Company for the \$1.7 million construction project.

Today, the 13-story Church Center for the United Nations continues to host groups from around the country for seminars on national and international issues from a Christian faith perspective, and is used by non-governmental organizations from around the world engaged in the important work of peace building. (UMC.org) Currently, our UWFaith National Offices are housed in this very building at 777 United Nations Plaza, United Women in Faith CCUN 11th Floor, New York, NY 10017.

Tillman Chapel at the Church Center is named after Sadie Tillman, who was president of the Women's Division when the center was built. In the cornerstone of this building is a book, *Way to a Warless World*, by Evelyn Riley Nicholson, the first president of the World Federation of Methodist Women. Dedicated in 1963. (UWC: 150 years in Mission)

Greetings to my sisters in Christ. Today, I want you to meet Mikele Haskins-Delmore, the Governance Chair of United Women in Faith. The May/June issue of *response* magazine (page 11) shares her powerful testimony of service, sisterhood, and spiritual calling. Mikele's life reflects a consistent embrace of leadership in church, community, and career. She has worked across fields with an entrepreneurial vision and a heart for service. Every effort she makes is rooted in the belief that each person plays a vital role in God's divine plan.

As she looks toward the future, Mikele is confident and hopeful. She believes United Women in Faith is uniquely positioned to lead the charge in addressing the pressing issues of today's calling on all members to move forward together, regardless of denomination or difference. Her advice is clear: "We cannot go backward. Together, we are stronger. Together, we are Love in Action." Sisters, we really are.

Her favorite scripture, Isaiah 40:30-31, reminds us of the power of spiritual renewal: "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles..." These words fuel her commitment and offer a beacon of hope to all who serve.

Above all, Mikele carries her faith and mission forward for the next generation. As a proud grandmother of seven, she wants her grandchildren to know that the path they walk was paved by those who believed, prayed, and acted on their behalf. She is living proof that when women unite in faith and action, generations are transformed.


- *2. Use the Daily Prayer Guide at each unit, general, or circle meeting to pray for mission personnel and mission projects. The Guide is updated annually and may be ordered from UWFaith Resources. Daily Prayer Guide entries are posted on the UWFaith Facebook Page as well as the Conference UWFaith page and our Appalachian District website, www.appumw.com/
- *3. Use at least two programs from the Program Resource book during the year. A new Program Resource is printed every year and may be ordered from UWFaith Resources. https://uwfaithresources.org/
- 18. Include a "response moment" at each unit or circle meeting where an item from response magazine is shared as a way to tell the mission story.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will complete Plan I of the United Women in Faith Reading Program and report to the unit on one of the books read.





Mission Today – 2025

Western North Carolina Conference United Women in Faith

The purpose of becoming a Mission Today Unit is to:

- Energize United Women in Faith to be more involved in mission through prayer, study, and action.
- Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so members understand where their money goes.
- Encourage the use of mission resources through UWFaith. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a unit? A unit is any organized group of UWFaith within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles or members from different churches which periodically meet as a unit.

How does a unit become a Mission Today unit?

To be recognized as a Mission Today unit (Gold, Silver, or Bronze), a unit must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated in the chart below. Activities conducted between January 1 and December 31 of the reporting year will be recognized at Annual Celebration the following year.

Criteria:

- *1. Make and meet the unit Pledge to Mission. Send Pledge amount and funds to the District Treasurer.

- *3. Use at least two programs from the Program Resource book during the year. A new <u>Program Resource</u> is printed every year and may be ordered from <u>UWFaith Resources</u>.
- *4. Conduct or participate in at least one mission study (virtual or in person). Contact your District or Conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn more about the studies. If members of your unit attend all sessions of Mission u or a District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study (Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc.), your unit will meet this criterion.
- *5. At least two members will subscribe to **response** magazine (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members; local unit subscription may count as one). Order information is provided at the bottom of p. 2. A one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription) is \$24; a one-year digital-only subscription is \$20. More information may be found at https://uwfaith.org/resources/response-magazine/.
- *6. Implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criterion. Possibilities include:
 - Read and discuss books and articles about other ethnicities and cultures.
 - Sponsor or attend an interethnic or intercultural event between two or more units.
 - Intentionally recruit women of various ethnic or cultural groups to be unit members and officers.
 - Use the Racial Justice resources available on our Conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources" or at this link: https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/
- *7. Have a program or take action addressing a United Women in Faith justice campaign (current campaigns are <u>Just Energy 4 All</u> and <u>Ending Mass Incarceration and Criminalization of Communities of Color</u>). More information may be found at https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/
- *8. Add at least two new members (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members).
- *9. Have a program from the <u>Social Principles of The United Methodist Church 2025-2028</u>. This resource may be purchased at <u>www.Cokesbury.com</u> for \$9.99 plus tax and shipping; available in paperback or eBook.
- *10. Contribute to all Five Channels of Giving (Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering).

- *11. Recite the UWFaith Purpose at each general and/or circle meeting, including virtual meetings.
- *12. Contribute \$189.60 or more to the Legacy Fund during the reporting year.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on the experience. Virtual participation qualifies.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend the District or Conference Annual Celebration and report back to the unit about the experience; virtual participation qualifies.
- 15. At least one person will join the United Women in Faith e-mailing list to receive and respond to advocacy information at least three (3) times a year. Attach the issue and action that was taken to Mission Today report.
- 16. Members will correspond with five people listed in the Daily Prayer Guide at least once a year.
- 17. Co-sponsor, with the local church, a "Children's Sabbath". This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children. Materials are available at https://uwfaith.org/event/childrens-sabbaths
- 18. Include a "**response** moment" at each unit or circle meeting where an item from **response** magazine is shared as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. Sponsor a teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or a young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one Conference event during the year.
- 20. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend a District Prayer Breakfast/Day Apart, Conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special District or Conference event (other than Ubuntu Day of Service). Virtual participation in any of these events qualifies.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will participate in and <u>Ubuntu Day</u> event. Units may develop their own Ubuntu event in their communities.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will complete Plan I of the United Women in Faith Reading Program and report to the unit on one of the books read. Find information here: https://uwfaith.org/resources/reading-program/
- 23. Invite a District or Conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings (may be virtual) and/or for a United Women in Faith Sunday. This qualifies as a local unit visit in the Nurturing Partners program.
- 24. Add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18-39) member or circle during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund.
- 26. Meet the 2025 Conference Financial Goal: To increase our "Gift in Memory" giving by 10% over 2024 giving.
- 27. Support at least one local mission project and participate in at least one Conference hands-on mission project during the year. List the local mission project on the Mission Today report.


