Secretary:

Is it mandatory to offer a motion for the approval of minutes? This question was addressed in our Northern Piedmont District newsletter, and I felt it was good information to pass on. As per *Robert*

Rules of Order, our approved governance guide, "The most efficient way of approving minutes is for the chair to assume the motion and obtain unanimous consent that the minutes be approved as distributed (or as corrected)." The presiding officer says, "The minutes have been [read/distributed]. Are there any corrections?" If corrections are offered, the chair handles each by offering the correction to the membership; just to be sure everyone agrees that the correction is accurate. The secretary then enters the corrections on the master copy. When no (further) corrections are offered, the presiding officer says, "If there are no (further) corrections . . (pause) . . the minutes are approved as read/distributed/corrected." Minutes can be read aloud to the members in the meeting, if you want to, but if time is precious, distribute the draft of the minutes in advance. Minutes drafted ahead of time are not the official minutes until the members approve them and they are signed by the secretary and president or the person who presides over the meeting for local units without a president or vice president. Remember to mark or stamp minutes as a "D-R-A-F-T" until minutes are finalized.

Social Action:

Greetings, My Fellow UMW!

May is National Foster Care Month.

May is set aside as National Foster Care Month honoring the foster parents, families and those who support children throughout their journey to find a permanent home.

A child's welfare takes priority every day in the lives of caseworkers, guardians, counselors, advocates, and foster parents. Building meaningful relationships and foundations take time. Every year, National Foster Care Month recognizes the dedicated people who promote compassionate, stable homes for children.

These parents and professionals focus not only on the emotional and physical needs of the children but on their long-term educational goals and overall health. Each step along the way, they are aware of the obstacles each child may have already had to overcome in life. Everyone deserves to be surrounded by the love and support of a family and foster care specialists seek to find the safest environment for every child.

HOW TO OBSERVE:

Support those who provide care and if you are able, consider being a foster parent. The need is increasing. Use #FosterCareMonth to share on social media. Visit www.childwelfare.gov to learn more.

Foster Care

Foster care is a temporary living arrangement for abused, neglected, and dependent children who need a safe place to live when their parents or another relative cannot take care of them. Often their families face issues such as illness, alcohol or drug addiction, or homelessness.

When Department of Social Services (DSS) cannot ensure a child's safety in their home, DSS contacts a local judge and requests custody of the child so the child can be placed in a foster home to ensure their safety. Length of stay in foster care varies from a few days to much longer.

Foster families are recruited, trained, and licensed to care for abused and neglected children temporarily, while their parents work with social work professionals to resolve their family issues. Relatives can be licensed as foster parents.

The foster family, DSS, and the birth family work together to return children to their own homes as quickly as possible. In some cases it is determined children cannot return to their birth family. In these situations, children may become free for adoption and foster parents may be considered as adoptive parents.

There is a great need for loving foster homes. Take Wilkes County for example: Wilkes County currently serves 230 children in foster care. DSS has 30 licensed foster homes. It is very important to keep these children in their own community because it helps keep them connected to their environment which includes school, church, and friends which normally results in less time they spend in foster care. Even if you only have a child for a few months, you have the ability to teach that child lifelong lessons.

Paying For the Child's Care

Foster parents receive financial compensation for a child's room, board, and other living expenses. The rate of compensation is depending on the age of the child. Wilkes DSS gives their foster homes an additional incentive per month over and above the state's rate. Foster parents also receive clothing allowance two times per year for each foster child in their home. Foster parents who are employed outside of the home may also qualify for daycare assistance.

Who Can Be a Foster Parent

Foster parents must:

- Be at least 21 years old
- Have a stable home and income. You may rent or own your home

- Be willing to be finger printed and have a criminal record check
- Maintain a drug free environment
- You can be married or single
- Complete all required training and be licensed by the state of North Carolina



150 years ago the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized by eight women, in Boston, March 23rd, 1869. Within a few weeks they had written a Purpose, adopted bylaws, voted to print and distribute a 'paper' (now called response magazine), organized a dozen new societies in near-by churches, and pledged money to support two single women missionaries in India: Isabella Thoburn (a teacher) and Clara Swain (a doctor). The women sailed in December, 1869; and started a class for girls

and small clinic for women immediately upon arrival. Today Isabella Thoburn College and Clara Swain Hospital continue as significant 21st century ministries. YOU are a critical and important part of this organization! How wonderful it is that we have this history of women stepping up to nurture and reach out to other women! Now is the time to share this wonderful group with friends and the many young women in our lives. Remember to invite, invite, invite!

Remember also your Nurturing Partners! Call us with ideas, problems and program needs. I hope to see you at our Spiritual Growth Retreat at the Lake in June.

From your Appalachian District Legacy Fund Energizer:

Reflection and Action

As I write to you today, the historic date of March 23, 2019 is not far away. I have been thinking about how my life might be different from the ladies of 150 years ago. I am 71 years young. Through the miracle of television and more recent technological advances, I have been a witness to many events in my lifetime.



I have seen men and women go into space, walk on the moon, construct a space station and I have seen failures that led to the deaths of some of these brilliant people. I have been a witness to the fury of Mother Nature – hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, fires, earthquakes, ice and snow storms, heat waves and bitter cold – both in person and in the media.

The age of innocence, for the younger generation, no doubt ended on September 11, 2001. But for me, the age of innocence ended on November 22, 1963 with the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. I lived near Houston, Texas at the time and, beyond the grief, also felt the shock and shame of something so horrible that happened in my home state. Like everyone else, I spent days glued to the television watching the aftermath of both of these infamous days.

I have also been a witness to human injustice and suffering – the Civil Rights marches and riots, the Vietnam Conflict, famines and deadly outbreaks of disease, and religious and civil wars around the world whose victims were mostly women and children.

We have all been a witness to the oppression and the tragedies and the atrocities. As Christians and, specifically, United Methodists we have responded to meet these disasters with our time, energy, money and our prayers. But what about the women 150 years ago that did not have the advantages we take for granted today? They had to rely on the actual testimony of others to gather information. So it was that two women – wives of missionaries who were home on furlough from India – spoke to six church women who had braved the rainy, stormy weather. Mrs. William Butler and Mrs. Edwin Parker were witnesses to the conditions of women's lives in India. They told of the social conditions in India that did not permit health care for most women and education for young girls. In 1869, these eight women formed the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. This small nucleus of women collected money and sent an educator, Isabella Thoburn, and Dr. Clara Swain to India. I could end here with the well known phrase 'and the rest is history'.

But we all know that the struggle continues even today for women's economic justice, maternal health, day care for children and education for youth around the world. Our rivers and streams are dumping grounds for toxic

waste and our oceans are populated with islands of plastic debris. In other words, our planet and the people living on it need our help.

By giving to the Legacy Fund, United Methodist Women can respond to these problems either with mission projects already in place or in partnership with other like-minded organizations.





Spiritual Growth Study: Mark and Radical Discipleship

Author Janet Wolf explores what it means to live a life of radical discipleship using the Gospel of Mark as a foundation. 

<u>From Boone, Wilkesboro</u>— Take US 421 south to Exit 282; Turn right onto NC115/Statesville Rd. In approx. 12.4 miles, turn left onto NC-901. In approx. 3 miles, turn right onto Indian Hill Rd. In 1.8 miles, turn right onto Jennings Rd. In 2.4 miles, turn left onto Mosswood Rd. Travel .5 miles and turn left into Grietje's Garden.

From I-77 (Sparta/Elkin) - Take I-77S toward Statesville to Exit 65 for Union Grove. Turn right onto HWY 901. Travel 2 miles. Turn left onto Jennings Road. Travel 4 miles. Turn left onto Mosswood Road. Travel .5 miles. Turn left into Grietje's Garden.

From Taylorsville/Hickory/Granite Falls/Statesville - Take I-40E to I-77N. Take the Tomlin Mill Road Exit. Turn left onto Tomlin Mill Road. Turn Right onto Jennings Road. Go approx. 4 miles. Take first paved road to the right past North Iredell Middle School (Mosswood Road). Take 2nd drive on the left into Grietje's Garden.
