# Interim Treasurer Giving is Always Good! Always!

As we approach the close of 2025 (that is hard to believe; I feel like I just got used to writing 2025) we still have many opportunities to make a significant difference in the lives of others as we support the Missions of United Women in Faith. Now is the perfect time to make a Giving Checklist for us to use as we review what opportunities for giving we have taken and which might be left to fulfill.

These include continuing giving to fulfill our Pledges as well as giving in honor of others such as our Gifts to Mission and our Gifts in Memory. It also includes giving in recognition of others we have seen playing a consequential role in support of Missions through action or encouragement with a Special Mission Recognition. With a minimum Gift of \$40 you can recognize that person with a Special Mission Recognition pin, a visible sign of their commitments to Mission.

Another special opportunity is participating in our World Thank Offering. This is an offering during which we commemorate the celebration of thanks that members have felt compelled to take as they witnessed the outpouring of love and compassion in support of the Missions of United Methodist (at that time) Women. Think of it as an opportunity for individuals to respond to God's abundance and grace with spontaneous gifts of gratitude. It is an offering that has been a tradition for over 100 years. It is a Tradition that has taken many different forms, all "Good". For instance, there are units that hold a yearly World Thank Offering program/service during which each member gives monies she has set aside throughout the year to bring to this offering at this special gathering. In contrast, some units take a World Thank Offering as a regular part of each meeting by passing a plate, box, or jar into which each member places her offering as she shares what she is thankful for that day. I recently witnessed this and it was powerful to experience.

In both cases the outcome is the same: the result of supporting the Missions of United Women in Faith is

- "good" that generates on-going "good" as we invest in changing and improving lives:
- if children through child care programs such as those offered in our many Bethlehem Centers of women by helping women build skills and confidence in themselves, breaking cycles of despair and dependence
- of youth with after-school activities provided by programs such as Shade and Fresh Water in Brazil.

John Wesley famously said, "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can".

And as we take stock of our giving, we remember Giving in support of United Women in Faith Missions is ALWAYS Good.

#### How are we Doing?

In the third issue of Appaladies in Mission I reported "Upon assessing the current status of our Appalachian District members mid-year giving, the outlook for achieving our 2025 Pledge to Mission is very good. Our 2025 Goal, (our Pledge to Mission) is \$30,000."

Social Action Why Climate Justice Matters

Climate change is one of the most pressing issues of our time, with far-reaching consequences that affect the

entire planet. However, the impacts of climate change are not felt equally across all communities. This is where the concept of climate justice comes into play. Climate Justice seeks to address the disproportionate burden that marginalized and vulnerable populations bear in the face of global environmental changes. It emphasizes the need for a fair and equitable approach to climate action, ensuring that those who are least responsible for climate change are not the ones who suffer the most.

One of the core principles of climate justice is recognizing the uneven distribution of climate change impacts. While industrialized nations have historically been the largest contributors to greenhouse gas emissions, it is often the developing countries and marginalized communities that face the most severe consequences. These communities are typically less resilient and have fewer resources to adapt to changing environmental conditions. This disparity is evident in various aspects:

- Extreme weather events, such as hurricanes, floods, and droughts, are becoming more frequent and
  intense due to climate change. Developing countries, particularly those in tropical regions, are more
  vulnerable to these events. For instance, small island nations face the threat of rising sea levels, which
  can lead to displacement and loss of livelihoods. In contrast, wealthier nations have better
  infrastructure, emergency response systems, and financial resources to mitigate the impacts of such
  events.
- The economic impact of climate change is also disproportionately felt by poorer communities.
   Agriculture, which is a primary source of livelihood for many in developing countries, is highly sensitive
   to climate variability. Crop failures due to droughts or floods can lead to food insecurity and economic
   instability. Furthermore, the cost of adaptation measures, such as building resilient infrastructure or
   relocating communities, can be prohibitively high for these nations.

Climate justice is not just an environmental issue; it is fundamentally an ethical and moral imperative. It calls for the recognition of the rights of all individuals to a safe and healthy environment. This involves holding those who have contributed the most to climate change accountable and ensuring that they take responsibility for mitigating its impacts. Several ethical considerations underscore the importance of climate justice:

- Climate justice is an essential component of the global response to climate change. It highlights the need for a fair and equitable approach that addresses the disproportionate impacts on marginalized and vulnerable communities.
- By recognizing the ethical imperatives and implementing inclusive and equitable strategies, we can create a more just and sustainable future for all.

The pursuit of climate justice is not only a matter of environmental stewardship but also a commitment to upholding the dignity and rights of every individual on this planet.

# Mission Today – 2025



#### Western North Carolina Conference United Women in Faith

#### The purpose of becoming a Mission Today Unit is to:

- Energize United Women in Faith to be more involved in mission through prayer, study, and action.
- Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so members understand where their money goes.
- Encourage the use of mission resources through UWFaith. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a unit? A unit is any organized group of UWFaith within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles or members from different churches which periodically meet as a unit.

#### How does a unit become a Mission Today unit?

To be recognized as a Mission Today unit (Gold, Silver, or Bronze), a unit must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated in the chart below. Activities conducted between January 1 and December 31 of the reporting year will be recognized at Annual Celebration the following year.

Gold	Complete 8 criteria:	Bronze
Complete 10 criteria: 6 with asterisks* and 4 other**	4 with asterisks* and 4 other**  **Other may include items with asterisks	Complete 6 criteria: 4 with asterisks* and 2 other**

#### Criteria:

- \*1. Make and meet the unit Pledge to Mission. Send Pledge amount and funds to the District Treasurer.
- \*2. Use the Daily Prayer Guide at each unit, general, or circle meeting to pray for mission personnel and mission projects. The Guide is updated annually and may be ordered from <a href="UWFaith Resources.">UWFaith Resources</a>. Daily Prayer Guide entries are posted on the <a href="UWFaith Facebook Page">UWFaith Facebook Page</a>.
- \*3. Use at least two programs from the Program Resource book during the year. A new <u>Program Resource</u> is printed every year and may be ordered from <u>UWFaith Resources</u>.
- \*4. Conduct or participate in at least one mission study (virtual or in person). Contact your District or Conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn more about the studies. If members of your unit attend all sessions of Mission u or a District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study (Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc.), your unit will meet this criterion.
- \*5. At least two members will subscribe to **response** magazine (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members; local unit subscription may count as one). Order information is provided at the bottom of p. 2. A one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription) is \$24; a one-year digital-only subscription is \$20. More information may be found at <a href="https://uwfaith.org/resources/response-magazine/">https://uwfaith.org/resources/response-magazine/</a>.
- \*6. Implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criterion. Possibilities include:
  - Read and discuss books and articles about other ethnicities and cultures.
  - Sponsor or attend an interethnic or intercultural event between two or more units.
  - Intentionally recruit women of various ethnic or cultural groups to be unit members and officers.
  - Use the Racial Justice resources available on our Conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources" or at this link: <a href="https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/">https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/</a>
- \*7. Have a program or take action addressing a United Women in Faith justice campaign (current campaigns are

  <u>Just Energy 4 All</u> and <u>Ending Mass Incarceration and Criminalization of Communities of Color</u>). More information may be found at <a href="https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/">https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/</a>
- \*8. Add at least two new members (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members).
- \*9. Have a program from the <u>Social Principles of The United Methodist Church 2025-2028</u>. This resource may be purchased at <u>www.Cokesbury.com</u> for \$9.99 plus tax and shipping; available in paperback or eBook.
- \*10. Contribute to all Five Channels of Giving (Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering).

- \*11. Recite the UWFaith Purpose at each general and/or circle meeting, including virtual meetings.
- \*12. Contribute \$189.60 or more to the Legacy Fund during the reporting year.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on the experience. Virtual participation qualifies.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend the District or Conference Annual Celebration and report back to the unit about the experience; virtual participation qualifies.
- 15. At least one person will join the United Women in Faith e-mailing list to receive and respond to advocacy information at least three (3) times a year. Attach the issue and action that was taken to Mission Today report.
- 16. Members will correspond with five people listed in the Daily Prayer Guide at least once a year.
- 17. Co-sponsor, with the local church, a "Children's Sabbath". This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children. Materials are available at <a href="https://uwfaith.org/event/childrens-sabbaths">https://uwfaith.org/event/childrens-sabbaths</a>
- 18. Include a "**response** moment" at each unit or circle meeting where an item from **response** magazine is shared as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. Sponsor a teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or a young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one Conference event during the year.
- 20. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend a District Prayer Breakfast/Day Apart, Conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special District or Conference event (other than Ubuntu Day of Service). Virtual participation in any of these events qualifies.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will participate in and <u>Ubuntu Day</u> event. Units may develop their own Ubuntu event in their communities.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will complete Plan I of the United Women in Faith <a href="Reading Program">Reading Program</a> and report to the unit on one of the books read. Find information here: <a href="https://uwfaith.org/resources/reading-program/">https://uwfaith.org/resources/reading-program/</a>
- 23. Invite a District or Conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings (may be virtual) and/or for a United Women in Faith Sunday. This qualifies as a local unit visit in the Nurturing Partners program.
- 24. Add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18-39) member or circle during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund.
- 26. Meet the 2025 Conference Financial Goal: To increase our "Gift in Memory" giving by 10% over 2024 giving.
- 27. Support at least one local mission project and participate in at least one Conference hands-on mission project during the year. List the local mission project on the Mission Today report.

# United Women in Faith Legacy Endowment Fund Update

Thank you for your generous and continuing support of Mission Giving and The Legacy Endowment Fund! The Legacy Endowment Fund is second-mile giving, after your critically important support of undesignated Mission Giving through Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering. Your Mission Giving supports the current work of United Women in Faith around the world, making a difference in the lives of women, children, and youth. As a permanently invested endowment, the Legacy Fund will be an ongoing source of income, providing the assurance that our important work can always continue.
