Mission Education and Interpretation:



Welcome to 2021! I am excited to start this New Year and excited to start in this new position as the Appalachian District ME&I Coordinator. 2020 was a difficult year for collecting and distributing mission supplies since most of our conference and district functions were canceled or virtual, but we did deliver some school and cleaning supplies to the Winston Salem Bethlehem Center, clothing for Project Agape to the Mission Resource Center (MRC) and 47 school kits and 45 hygiene kits to the MRC. Thank you to those units that supported our Hands on Missions in 2020. Our Hands on

Mission for the District 'virtual' Spiritual Renewal Gathering will be Bethlehem Center school and cleaning supplies and for the District 'virtual' Mission Study will be UMCOR School Kits and Hygiene Kits. As we will be having many virtual events again in 2021, we are working to develop a district plan for Hands on Mission "drop off" locations – Mission needs are still very much alive and very much a purpose of UMW.

At our 2020 District Annual meeting, we celebrated 16 Mission Today units. I would like to challenge each Appalachian District unit to make a difference and strive to become a Mission Today Unit in 2021. Why? Becoming a Mission Today unit energizes United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action; increases contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes; encourages the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women; and expands concepts of mission, including social justice as mission. There are three levels of Mission Today (Gold, Silver, and Bronze) and units achieve these levels by completing a designated number of specific criteria on the Mission Today requirements; you can find the requirements listed on the WNCC UMW website (https://wnccumw.org/missiontoday).

Lastly, I would like to encourage UMW members to attend our Appalachian District Mission Study, **Women United for Change: 150 Years in Mission,** via Zoom on Saturday, April 24th and Sunday, April 25th from 2:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day. Our study leader, Rev. Lisa Beth White, will teach us about women who established vibrant societies to support mission. (See the Mission Study flyer on page 8.) Your unit can satisfy Mission Today criteria #4 by individuals attending this study and the unit taking an action based on this study or giving a Gift to Mission. As I reflect back on the year 2020, I realize I have received many blessings (many in disguise!). As the pandemic continues to rage in our world, we as United Methodist Women must continue our support of women, children, and youth through Mission Giving. Our giving has provided food, shelter, medical treatment and educational opportunities for many who otherwise would not have received these needs in 2020 and continues in 2021.

If you have not sent in the blue "Pledge and Officer Information Form - 2021," it is not too late. I need this information to update the district records to make sure all information will go to the correct person(s) and record your unit's pledge for 2021.. Also, if you have not sent in the form listing all Gift to Mission Honorees, Special Mission Recognition (pin) recipients, and Gifts in Memory for 2020, please mail or e:mail to me by February 1, 2021. This information is needed to complete the district records and to include in the District Annual Meeting booklet.

The 2021 Mission Giving quarters are as follows: 1st Quarter: December 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021

2nd Quarter: March 1, 2021 - May 31, 2021 3rd Quarter: June 1, 2021 - August 31, 2021 4th Quarter: September 1, 2021 - November 30, 2021

All Local Unit Treasurers will receive a letter from me at the first of the month before the end of the Mission quarter. These letters will be mailed by February 1, May 1, August 1, and November 1. Please, I urge you to read these letters; you will find a lot of important information in these letters to help you fulfill your role as your Unit Treasurer. The role of the Local Unit Treasurer is very important as

you can help your unit understand why Mission Giving is needed to help carry out the PURPOSE OF UMW. You are responsible for making deposits and payments from your local unit's UMW checking account, keeping accurate records of these transactions, and reporting the financial activity to your unit. You are responsible for remitting all funds (pledges, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission cards, and Gift in Memory cards) to the Appalachian District Treasurer. All checks should be made payable to *Appalachian District UMW Treasurer*. ALL checks must be sent with a Remittance Form. A blank remittance form will be mailed with the 1st Quarter letter. My role for the Appalachian District as Treasurer, is to receive ALL Mission Giving funds, keep the financial records, and channel the funds to the Conference Treasurer.

Hope to see many of you virtually for our District Spiritual Renewal Gathering (Prayer Breakfast) and Mission Study. More information is found in this newsletter.

Women United for Change: 150 Years in Mission Study Leader: Rev. Lisa Beth White

This study provides a historical survey of United Methodist Women and its predecessor organizations and amplifies the voices that shaped the work through an overarching story of United Methodist Women changing the fact of mission. This study is about women who established vibrant societies to support mission.

Attendance at this study will fulfill requirements for Mission Today Criteria #4.

Conference Hands on Mission Project:

UMCOR Hygiene Kits {Kit Contains:1 Hand Towel: 15" x 25" up to 17" X 27" (No kitchen, cleaning or microfiber towels please); 1 Washcloth - No kitchen towels; 1 Comb - sturdy - No rattail or picks; 1 Nail Clipper - No nail file or emery; 1 Bar Soap - 3 oz or larger; 1 Adult Toothbrush - No multipacks and in manufacturer covering; 10 Adhesive Bandages - 3/4" x 3"} Place items in 1-gallon resealable plastic bag; Include \$2 for shipping (DO NOT PUT in Bag but send to Nancy Johnson, District Treasurer.)

OR

UMCOR School Kits {Kit Contains: One pair blunt scissors (round tip only & no plastic scissors); one box of 24 crayons; three one-subject notebooks (no marble composition books & no 3- or 5-subject notebooks); one pack of loose-leaf paper (100 to 200 page packets/wide or college-rule accepted); one hand-held pencil sharpener (1-inch or longer & remove from packaging); one ruler (12" or 30 centimeters long and sturdy or flexible material accepted); six unsharpened pencils; one eraser (2" or larger); one two-gallon re-sealable plastic bag} Place all kit items inside two-gallon bag; do not put any notes, money or additional material inside the bag.
